

What are PFAS?

PFAS, commonly known as "Forever Chemicals" are synthetic chemicals highly resistant to degradation.

EPA noted health impacts:

- Reproductive effects (infertility, blood pressure)
- Developmental delays in children
- Increased risk of some cancers
- Immune system compromise
- Elevated cholesterol
- Hormone interference
